




the development, we must know the nature of consciousness first and then we can examine whether there is any possibility to impute it in Artificial Intelligence or not.



INTRODUCTION

It is undeniable that women in ancient India used to enjoy an equal status with men in every aspect of life which inter alia includes the educational right as well. Apala, Gargi, Lopamudra, Lilabati, Maitreyi, etc. were few examples of eminent women who held a dignified position in that period for their knowledge and devotion. Unfortunately, the invasion of the Mughal and British rulers largely affected the condition of women in India, However, the overall literacy rate of India after independence gradually revived from 18.33 percent (1951 census) to 74.04 percent (2011 census). On the other hand, the gender literacy gap between men and women started from 18.30 percent (1951 census) to 16.68 (2011 census) does not indicate a consistent and significant outcome thereof. A study published by Statista in 2021 shows that the gender literacy gap is mostly found in rural India where 65.9 percent women are illiterate as compared to male counterparts of 81.5 percent. Indian educational structure is mostly influenced by British colonialism and the Radhakrishnan Commission in 1948-49 advocated for its immediate reconstruction. Other educational commissions such as Mudaliar Commission (1952-53) and Kothari commission (1964-66) were also constituted at a later stage. Based on the recommendation of the Kothari commission, the first National Policy on Education (NPE) was formulated in 1968 to bring uniformity in the educational structure throughout the country. The NPE further went through several modifications and developments respectively in 1986, 1992 and recently replaced with the National Education Policy (NEP) in 2020. The prime objectives of the present study are to find out the answer of the following questions: how far the moderations of NEPs of India since independence address the challenges of women to access the quality education and uphold the equality for women's education? and what are the desired changes that the government wants to bring in the near future for development of women's education through
