INTRODUCTION



The National Cadet Corps was found during World War II that in the absence of any coordinated training schools and colleges, candidates who came forward for army commission lacked the basic qualities of initiative, self-confidence and sense of responsibility. The National Cadet Corps (NCC) committee had been appointed in 1946 to study the entire problem. Recommendations of the committee were accepted, and led to the passage of the National Cadet Corps Act in April 1948. Today its strength stands more than 15 Lakhs. There are 788 NCC units spread in the country, cover about 4500 colleges and 6500 schools. We are proud to be a part of this elite youth organization. It has three wings- Army Navy and Air Force each wings has girls and boys division. Our college has the Army wings, it is a company of 20 Bengal battalion NCC (infantry) and the battalion is presently



commanding by Lt. Col. Dipnarayan Bagchi. Our college troop number is 20/7 and the troop is commanding by Lt. Dr. Trijit Nanda.

HISTORY

NCC was first started in 1666 in Germany. The NCC in India was formed with the National Cadet Corps Act of 1948. It was raised on 15 July 1948. The origin of NCC can be traced back to the 'University Corps', which was created under the Indian Defence Act 1917, with the objective to make up the shortage of the Army. In 1920, when the Indian Territorial Act was passed, the 'University Corps' was replaced by the University Training Corps (UTC). The aim was to raise the status of the UTC and make it more attractive to the youth. The UTC Officers and cadets dressed like the army. It was a significant step towards the Indianisation of armed forces. It was rechristened in the form of UOTC so the National Cadet Corps can be considered as a successor of the University Officers Training Corps (UOTC) which was established by the British Government in 1942. During World War II, the UOTC never came up to the expectations set by the British. This led to the idea that some better schemes should be formed, which could train more young men in a better way, even during peace. A committee headed by Pandit H.N. Kunzru recommended a cadet organization to be established in schools and colleges at a national level. The National Cadet Corps Act was accepted by the Governor General and on 15 July 1948 the National Cadet Corps came into existence.

In 1949, the Girls Division was raised in order to give equal opportunities to school and college going girls. The NCC was given an inter-service image in 1950 when the Air Wing was added, followed by the Naval Wing in 1952. Same year, the NCC curriculum was extended to include community development/social service activities as a part of the NCC syllabus at the behest of Late Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru who took keen interest in the growth of the NCC. During 1960, NCC Rifles was established to impart NCC training to maximum number of students and following the 1962 Sino-Indian War, to meet the requirement of the Nation,

NCC MOTTO

The motto of NCC is 'Unity & Discipline' which was adopted on 23 Dec 1957. In living up to its motto, the NCC strives to be and is one of the greatest cohesive forces of the nation, bringing together the youth hailing from different parts of the country and molding them into united, secular and disciplined citizens of the nation.

NCC FLAG



In 1954 the existing tricolor flag was introduced. The three colors in the flag depict the three services in the Corps, red for Army, deep blue for Navy and light blue for the Air Force. The letters NCC and the NCC

crest in gold in the middle of the flag encircled by a wreath of lotus, give the flag a colorful look and a distinct identity. Each lotus represents one NCC Directorate (Dte).

NCC SONG

The desirability of composing a NCC song was considered in January 1956. An Official Song of the NCC titled "Kadam Mila Ke Chal" was adopted in 1963 and registered in 1969 with the approval of Ministry Of Defence. In 1974 it was felt that the NCC song has failed to catch the imagination of the youth and there was need for a change. In Oct 1982, it changed to the current NCC Song titled "Ham Sabh Bhartiya Hain". "Ham Sabh Bhartiya Hain" - NCC song is written by [Haricharan Singh Parvana]

h) Reach out to the youths of friendly foreign countries through Youth Ex-change Programme (YEP).

ORGANIZATION

At Headquarters level, the NCC is headed by a Director General with the rank of lieutenant-general. He is assisted by two Additional Director Generals (A and B) of two-star rank (major-general, rear-admiral or air vice-marshal). Five Brigadier level officers and other civil officials also assist him. The Headquarters is located in Delhi. There are 17 Directorates located in the state capitals headed by an officer of the rank of a Maj Gen from the three Services. Depending upon the size of the state and growth of NCC in the states, Directorates have up to 14 Group Headquarters under them through which they exercise their command and control of the organization in the state. Each group is headed by an officer of the rank of Brigadier or equivalent known as Group Commander. Each NCC Group Headquarters control 5-7 units (Bns) commanded by Colonel/Lt.Col. or equivalent. Each Battalion consists of companies which are commanded by the Associate NCC Officer (ANO) of the rank of lieutenant to major. In all there are 95 Group Headquarters in the country who exercise control over a network of 667 Army Wing Units (including technical and girls unit), 60 Naval Wing Units and 61 Air Squadrons. There are two training establishments namely Officers Training School, Kamptee (Nagpur, Maharashtra) and Women Officers Training School, Gwalior.

The NCC functions under the overall supervision of Central Advisory Committee. The constitution of the committee is as follows

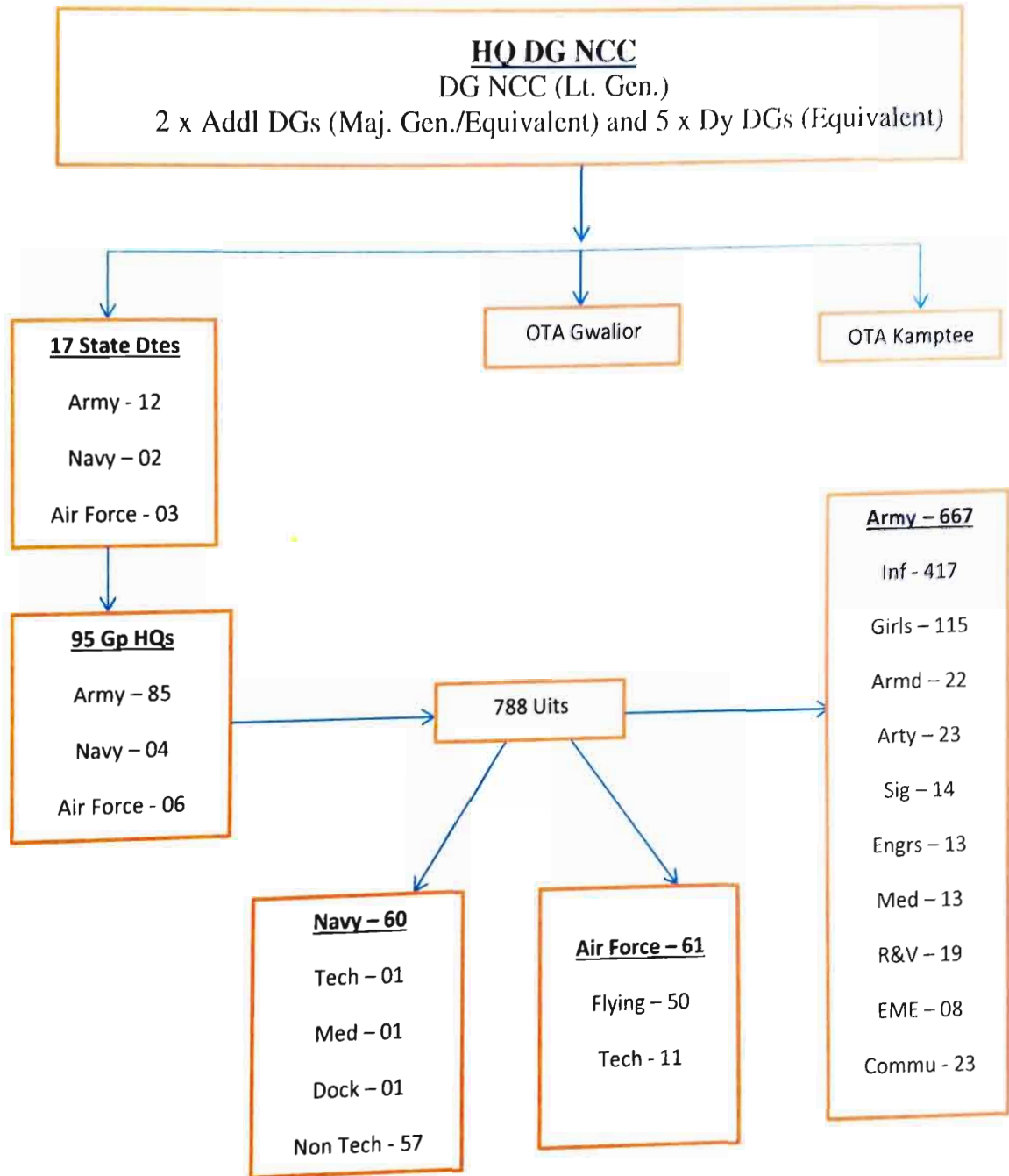
1. Raksha Rajya Mantri - Chairman

The Defence Secretary, Ministry of Defence is the overall in-charge, who is responsible to the Govt. of India for efficient functioning of the NCC.

Today the NCC is quite popular in our country and now in its training syllabus Social Service, Adventure training and Ecology/Nature Awareness have also been included.

Today, its strength stands more than 13 Lakhs. There are 788 NCC Units spread in the country, cover about 4500 colleges and 6500 schools.

TRAINING

The training of NCC cadets has been divided in three Divisions: -

- 1) **Senior Division** - In this Division students of college/universities of the age group of 15-26 years take training. This training is for 2 years. Senior division divided into three wings i.e. Army wing, Navy wing, and Air Force wing. In the Army wing NCC, the units are like that of Army i.e. (i) Armored corps (ii) Artillery (iii) Infantry (iv) Engineers (v) Signals (vi) Electrical Mechanical Engineer (vii) Medical (viii) Communication (ix) Remount and Veterinary corps
- 2) **Junior Division**: - In the junior, students of 13 to 16 ½ years of age studying in secondary school are enrolled. Their training is for 2 years. In the Junior Division also there are Army wing Navy wing and Air Force wing.
- 3) **Girls Division**: - In this division there are senior and junior wings. The Senior Division has companies of signal, medical and nursing. Training in the senior division is for 3 years, in junior division for 2 years.

The name of the NCC training activities as follows:-

REPUBLIC DAY CAMP (RDC)

- Before RDC all group headquarters have to face the IGC (Inter-Group Competition)
- NCC Republic Day Camp is the culmination of all NCC Training activities. RDC is held at Garrison Parade Ground, Delhi Cant from 01 to 29 Jan. 1850 Selected NCC Cadets from 17 directorates attend the Camp. The Camp is inaugurated by the Vice President of India and culminates with Prime Minister's Rally on 28 Jan.
- During the camp visit of Raksha Mantri, Cabinet Ministers, Chief Minister of Delhi, three Service Chiefs and various State Ministers/VIPs are also organized.
- During the RDC, various competitions are conducted amongst the 17 NCC Directorates to decide the Champion Directorate for award of Prime Minister's Banner. Competitions are keenly contested in various events such as National Integration Awareness presentation, Drill, Line & Flag Area, Cultural Programs i.e. (group song, group dance & ballet), Best Cadet of Senior Division (Boys) and Senior Wing (Girls) in each Service - Army, Navy & Air Discipline and Best Cadet Boys and Girls each from Junior Wing. Aero modeling and Ship modeling are also conducted during RDC.

Thal Sainik Camp (TSC)

The TSC is a 12 days camp conducted in Delhi every year in the late autumn, in which the cadets are selected from all 17 directorates (30+3 cadets from each directorate), by the selection procedure conducting 3 pre-TSC camps each of 10-12 days in a week interval. The selected cadets then are sent to the TSC to represent their respective directorates in the following competitions:

- Obstacle course - In which the obstacles includes 6-feet wall, zig-zag, double ditch, balancing, 3-feet bar, left bar, right bar, incline, etc. It is done after wearing full tactile gear with rifle.
- Firing - It consists of two types - Shooting (Grouping, Snap-shooting & Application) & Advance Firing (Standing, Kneeling & Lying positions). It is done with a standard .22 caliber rifle at the range of 25 meters & 50 meters.
- Map Reading - Which includes working with Prismatic Compass, service protector & a map. It is conducted in the day or at night for finding 'North', 'Grid Positions' & 'Own Position', with the help of landscapes at the unknown location in which cadets are dropped.
- Home Nursing - It consists of medical activities, as how to aid & heal a soldier in war.

The directorates also get marks by the inspection of their respective accommodations, dressing and some extracurricular activities by the inspecting squad. Arranging the numbers, the winning directorate gets a cup with decorations from the Director General, NCC on the closing day of the TSC. Two concurrent TSCs are conducted at RD Parade Ground, Delhi Cantt every year. i.e. S D / JD boys and SW / JW girls. 640 Boy and 640 Girls cadets take part in this camps

Vayu Sainik Camp(VSC)

This centrally organised camp is organised for Air Wing Cadets. Cadets from all Directorates attend the camp. VSC is generally conducted in the month of October at Bengaluru.

Nau Sainik Camp(NSC)

This centrally organised Naval Camp is conducted annually for selected Naval Wing Cadets. Boat pulling, semaphore, tent pitching, drill competitions are the main attraction of the camp. It is generally held at Naval Maritime Academy (NAMAC) at Visakhapatnam but started to held at Karwar from 2014.

All India Yachting Regetta (AIYR)

This centrally organised Naval Camp is conducted annually for selected Naval Wing Cadets. Yachting (Sailing) is the main attraction of the camp. It is generally held at Naval Base INS-Chilka at Odisha.

Rock Climbing Camps (RCC)

Eight rock climbing camps are held each year to expose the cadets to the basics of elementary rock climbing and to inculcate spirit of adventure amongst cadets. Four of these camps are held at Gwalior in Madhya Pradesh and other four camps at Nanyardam near Trivandrum in Kerala.

Naval Wing Activities

Naval wing syllabus is common for both boys & girls. During sea training naval subjects like Seamanship, Navigation, Communication, Gunnery, Damage Control and Ship Safety are taught to cadets. Swimming, Scuba Diving and Wind Surfing are other interesting activities.

Air Wing Activities

Gliding, Micro lite Flying(generally ZENAIR CH 701 STOL AC) and attachment training with Airforce Stations/Establishments are the main activities.

Youth Exchange Programme

The aim of YEP is a country-to-country exchange of cadets belonging to NCC/equivalent Govt/Youth Organizations of friendly countries and participation in various activities and appreciation of each other's socio-economic and cultural realities

Combined Annual Training Camps (CATC)

In C.A.T.C., the cadets are trained in basic skills of survival and emergencies. They are also taught certain skills pertaining specifically to their Wing for e.g., a Naval cadet is trained in boat-rowing, oaring, Semaphore, etc. Another activity in the camp is the "dogwatch" wherein two cadets are to stay on sentry duty for two hours at any time given time of the day. Those caught sleeping, especially during late night or early morning shifts, or otherwise missing from duty are severely reprimanded or penalized. Cadets are also introduced to weapons such as a .22 caliber rifle.

National Integration Camp (NIC)

NIC is to propagate national integration among cadets and society. Only the best cadets in drills and march are sent to represent their states. This camp is considered for SSLC and higher secondary course(+2) grade mark. These camps are conducted on All India basis and help bridge the cultural gap among various States of India. In addition, there are six special NICs conducted at Leh, Nagrota (J&K), Chakabama (NER, Nagaland), Srinagar, Lakshadweep and Port Blair.

In this camp cadets are taught leadership quality and stage dairing
Advance leadership course

Advanced leader ship camp is conducted in many places. in this camp the officers give cadets training for ssb screening and entrance.

Army Attachment Camp

These camps are conducted by the NCC in collaboration with Indian Army, as the willing cadets are attached to the specific regiments under going the training period of 10-15 days. In this camp, the cadets are trained by the instructors of the particular regiment, in the military tactics including day/night warfare & also get familiar with the weaponry.

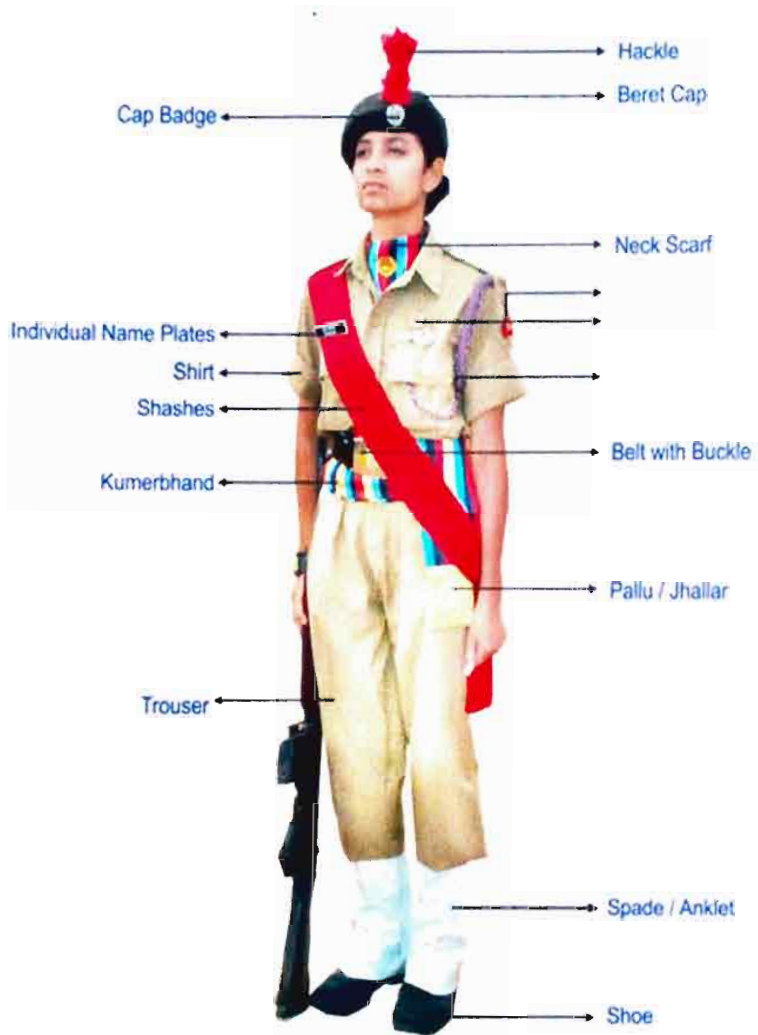
Naval Wing Activities

UNIFORM PATTERN



UNIFORM

Army cadets wear khaki uniform. Naval cadets wear white uniform of Navy. Air Force cadets wear light blue grey (LBG) uniform. The uniform is compulsory on all the occasions.

Cadets from SD boys Army wing wear khaki full sleeve shirt and trousers & cadets from JD wear khaki shirt & khaki shorts. Girl cadets from SW & JW both wear khaki full sleeve shirt and trousers. Cadets from SD boys Naval wing wear white half sleeve shirt and white trousers & JD boys wear half sleeve white shirt and white shorts. Girls from Naval wing SW & JW wear white half sleeve shirt and trousers. Cadets from SD boys Air wing wear light blue half sleeve shirts and trousers & JD cadets wear light blue half sleeve shirts and trousers. Girls from SW and JW wear light blue half sleeve shirts and trouser.

In addition to these SW & JW cadets wear white salwar and kamiz during activities other than parade. Rifle green beret is compulsory for all the cadets except Sikh cadets who wear rifle green turban. For physical training cadets wear brown canvas shoes and for drills black leather shoes called D.M.S (Drill March Shoes). Woolen vests are compulsory in cold areas whose colour varies khaki for army, dark blue for navy, and black for air. (Even NCC cadets wear INDIAN ARMY uniforms sometimes.)

STRENGTH

• Army: Each battalion or unit of NCC consists of a number of platoons or coy. For senior division boys each platoon consists of 52 cadets and each coy consists 160 cadets. Each BN has 4 to 7 coys so each BN carries around 640 to 1120 cadets. A senior wing girls BN consists of 2

to 7 coy means a total of 320 to 1120 cadets. For junior division boys and junior wing girls each troop has 100 cadets and each BN has at least one troop.

- **Navy:** For senior division boys each BN or unit consists of 4 to 8 divisions and each division consists of 50 cadets. For senior wing girls similar arrangement exists as of senior division boys. For junior division boys and junior wing girls each BN has a troop of 100 cadets.

- **Air:** For senior division boys and senior wing girls each unit consists of at least 2 fleets each consists of 100 cadets. So each unit known as Squadron carries around 200 cadets. For junior wing girls and junior division boys each squadron has a troop consisted of 100 cadets. However, each unit can have up to 24 troops of senior division boys expanding their strength to 2400 cadets but this is maximum limit.

- b) Functions –** To purchase rations from Supply Depot/local market, two days before the arrival of Cadets. After the camp commences, cadet will be detailed as members who will be changed every three days.

3. **Sport Committee-** This committee is responsible to conduct Inter Company Competitions in afternoon session. Sports which are included are Kabaddi, Basket Ball, Volley Ball etc.
4. **Training Committee-** Includes Sr. ANO with Sub. Maj. And one JCO/NCO. They are responsible to give the training to cadets, in Drill, Weapon Training and arrange Demo like Section Attack, section formation Patrolling etc.
5. **Cultural Programme Committee-** They conduct cultural programme, institution wise and select a team for final day programme. The events are solo song, group song, dance, group dance, musical instrument playing etc. Cultural programme committee presents the final selected items at the time of camp fire.
6. **Messing Committee-** It includes Deputy Camp Commandant. One ANO and two or three cadets. They are responsible for preparation of menu for three days. A messing officer is appointed for Cadet's Mess who looks after the food preparation, distribution of food etc.
7. **Competition Committee-** Various competitions are conducted during camps like Drill, Room layout/Kit layout, Flag area Competition, Firing, and Quiz & G.K. which helps to select the "Best Cadet" in camp.

CERTIFICATES & EXAMINATIONS

There are Three Certificates in NCC. Below describes about it from lower value to higher value:-

- Certificate - A : It can be written by JD/ JW cadets of NCC, cadets of class 8 & 9. After passing those classes it can't be obtained. The candidate must have attended a minimum 75% of total training periods laid down in the syllabus for the first & second years of JD/JW NCC(All Wings). The candidate must have attended one Annual Training Camp.
- Certificate - B : It can be written by SD / SW cadets of NCC, cadets after class 10 & those studying for +2, +3 (degree). In the second year of training they can appear for the same. The candidate must have attended a minimum 75% of total training periods laid down in the syllabus for the first & second years of SD/SW

NCC (All Wings). He/She must have attended one Annual Training Camp/NIC. Cadets possessing 'A' certificate will be awarded 10 bonus marks. An air wing cadet must do a minimum 10 Glide launches.

- Certificate - C : It is the Most important certificate for NCC cadet. Now it can be written in the 3rd year of training, in the 3rd year of degree course / those having B certificate can write it in the first year after his +2 and in the 1st year of degree by SD / SW cadets only. The candidate must be possessing a 'B' certificate. Must have attended two ATCs or one ATC and in addition to it RD Camp Delhi, Centrally Organised Camp, Para Training Camp, Attachment Training with service units, National Integration Camp, Youth Exchange Programme, Foreign Cruise (Navy).

GRADING IN CERTIFICATE

Three certificates are awarded (1) A grade, (2) B grade, (3) C grade.

The best certificate is C, which has the highest value. (i) A cadet has to obtain 45% marks in each paper & 50% marks in the aggregate to pass the examination. Grading is based on total marks obtained will be awarded as follows.

(aa) Grading 'A' - Cadets obtaining 80% marks and above. (ab) Grading 'B' - Cadets obtaining 65% marks and above but below 80%. (ac) Grading 'C' - Cadets obtaining 50% marks and above but below 65%. (ad) Fail - Cadets obtaining less than 45% in any paper or less than 50% in aggregate.

FUNDING OF THE NCC

The NCC activities receive their financial support from three sources as under-

a) Ministry of Defence: - It provides the entire budget to cover pay and allowances of the entire military staff, unit equipment of all the NCC units, ammunition for the small arms given to the NCC clothing and uniform items for the cadets, all major equipment to support adventure activities such as gliders, trekking and mountaineering kits, horses, boats, etc and 50% expenditure of all camps as also pay and allowances of civilian staff of NCC HQ and state directorate.

b) State Government: - They give support to cover all training of ANOs, washing allowances, recurring running expenditure by way of fuel, rental of buildings occupied by Group HQ and the NCC units pay of state civil staff, etc and camp expenditure up to 50%.

ADVANTAGES OF NCC TRAINING TO STUDENTS

1. By NCC training, students develop qualities like social service, team spirit, leadership, discipline and self-confidence.
2. Since NCC training camps are held at different places in the country, cadets get opportunity to visit important historical and industrial places and social centers. Due to this students widen their horizon and develop ambition to do creative work.
3. NCC cadets are taught civil defence and self-defence. Due to this students develop national spirit and confidence.
4. Army wing NCC cadets are attached with Army units every year so that they get acquainted with the Army life.
5. NCC cadets are trained for parachute jumps and mountaineering so that they develop capacity to do courageous work.
6. Under Colombo plan, selected cadets are sent to foreign countries every year.
7. Many industries given priority in jobs for NCC trained students.
8. Central and state Govts. Also give priority in job for NCC trained students.
9. Priority is given to NCC trained students by universities in B.Ed. M.A. M.Sc. M.Sc. (Ag) admission and hostel.
10. NCC cadets are given refreshment on every parade and are given washing allowance for uniform.
11. NCC cadets are given facility to purchase goods from military canteen.

HONOURS AND AWARDS

1. The NCC was introduced with the view to provide secular, united and disciplined citizens for the future India. With the passage of time, the NCC personnel achieved historic feats and did exceptional acts which needed to be commanded and elevated at the national level. For this purpose the following awards were instituted in order to not only provide recognition NCC personnel but to motivate other also to emulate.

- a) Raksha Mantri's Padak Awarded by the Raksha Mantri.
- b) Raksha Mantri's Prasansa Patra Awarded by the Raksha Mantri.
- c) Raksha Sachiv's Prasansa Patra Awarded by the Defence Secretary
- d) Mahanideshak's Prasansa Patra. Awarded by the Director General NCC.

2. While the Defence Secretary's prasansa Patra and the DGNCC's Prasansa Patras were instituted in 1984 the Raksha Mantri's Padak and Raksha Mantri's Prasansa Patras were started in 1989.

3. The following category of NCC personnel are eligible for these awards-

- a) NCC Whole Time Officers.
- b) Associate NCC Officers (ANOs)
- c) Under Officer Instructors & Sergeant Major Instructors.
- d) NCC cadets (both boys and girls)

4. These awards are given to individuals who perform an exceptional act involving courage, devotion to duty and any contribution of lasting value to the organization and the one which bring glory and fame to the NCC the highest award is Raksha Mantri's padak. Only one Raksha Mantri's Padak and one Prashansa Patra is awarded per year. These awards are announced on the NCC Day which falls on the last Sunday of the month of November, every year and are given by the Hon'ble Raksha Mantri during his visit to the Republic Day NCC camp.

TRAINING STAFF STRUCTURE

The training in the NCC is conducted through following three tier systems: -

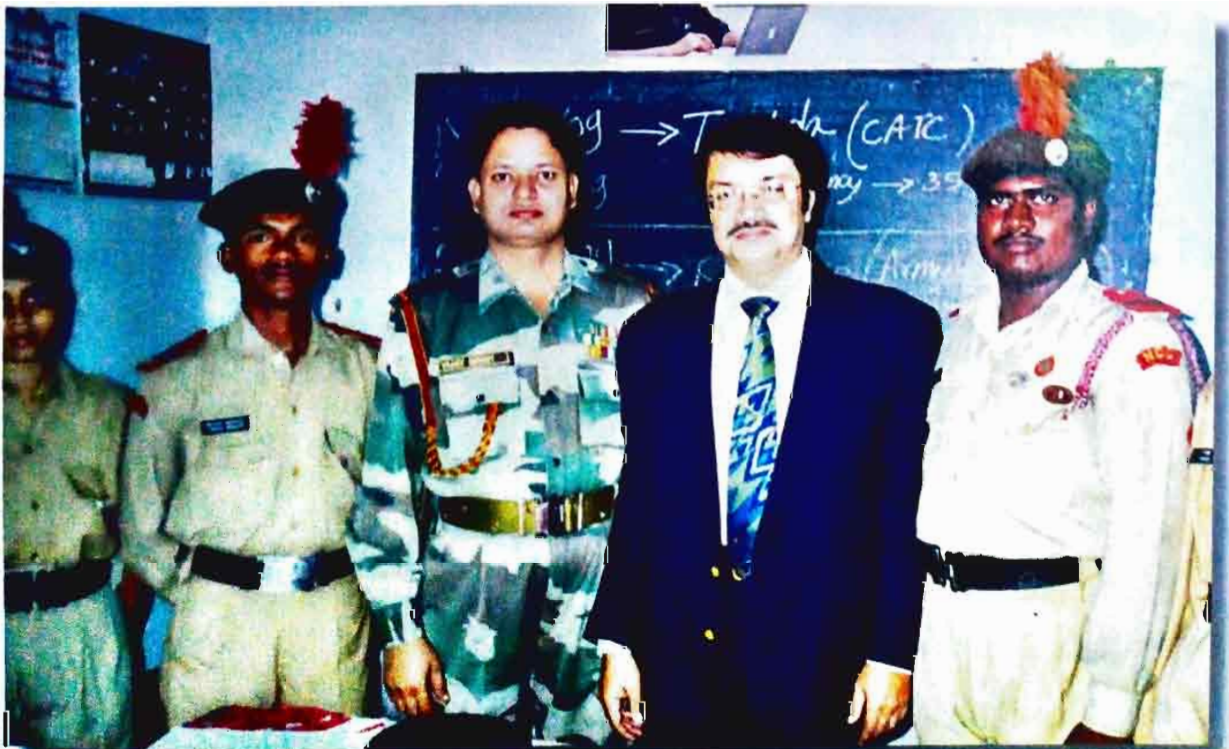
- a) Regular and whole Time Officers: - In the first tier, there are regular officers from the Army, Navy and Air Force and whole time NCC Officers (WTOs) and whole time Lady Officers (WTLOs) who have been enrolled for this purpose. They provide the overall guidance and supervision for the conduct of the training.
- b) Associate NCC Officers(ANOs): - In the second tier, there are ANOs from colleges and schools who are the teachers/lecturers/professors, both male and female, who from a very important part in the conduct of the training and allied activities in relation to the students enrolled as cadets from their respective institutions.
- c) ICOs, NCOs and Equivalent from Navy and Air Force: - These constitute the ground staff for physical conduct of the institutional service training and indeed form the backbone of the entire programme.
- d) Girl Cadet Instructors (GCIs): - They are a very important link in the chain relating to imparting training to girl cadets. They provide training and act as escorts to girl cadets in various organized camps and adventure activities.
- e) Civil Gliding Instructors (CGIs): - To impart institutional training to NCC cadets in gliding, Air Force pilots were engaged initially but over the year shortage of Air Force pilots compelled induction of Civil Gliding Instructors with the result that today 50% of the Air wings in the NCC have their strength Civil Gliding Instructors who have been employed by the Government through UPSC
- f) Civilian Staff: - All the state NCC Dtes have civilian staff of various categories to function efficiently.

In the year 2008 our college authority decides to sharp the cutting edges by grooming the future leaders. On June 19, 2008 our college got the authorization for the NCC sub-unit under the leadership of Lt. Dr. Trijit Nanda, the faculty of the department of zoology.



The college has been taken under the command of 20 Bengal battalion NCC which is presently commanding by Lt. Col. Dipnarayan Bagchi. The battalion Head Quarter is located at southern avenue. Since its inception we had the strength of 107 cadets-62 boys and 45 girls and Lt. Dr. Nanda was nominated as the CTO of this sub-unit and he was invited as an observer in Republic Day parade at New Delhi then he was also selected for Pre-Commission course at Officers Training Academy (OTA) Kamptee for the honorary commissioned service and he was selected by the military officials of NCC directorate West Bengal & Sikkim.

After completing his three month training course he was commissioned in Indian Army as an Associate NCC Officer. Presently he is our company commander and head of the department of zoology. There are always tough competition in every activities and our college has proved its dexterity by participating in every glamorous and challenging event and performing with a glory. Our college had seen flying colors within very few times from its inception. The first two girls cadet was selected for All India Thal Sainik Camp held in New Delhi and got silver and bronze medal as the best firer.

GOVERNING TEAM OF NCC OF VIVEKANANDA COLLEGE

Since its inception our company commandant decided to create a disciplined administration to maintain the work culture among the cadets. We don't have any specialized recruited staff to execute the activities of its administrative works; we groomed and trained cadets to execute the total procedure and regular activities. Our administration divided in two committees, both committees chaired by the company commandant, the committees are as follows-

ADVISORY COMMITTEE: - The advisory committee is specially designed for planning, and SWOT analysis and sometime its respond to any emergency critical situation of the organization. The committee organizes two annual meeting on recruitment and accounts matter which also includes other matters.

The appointments of this committee are;

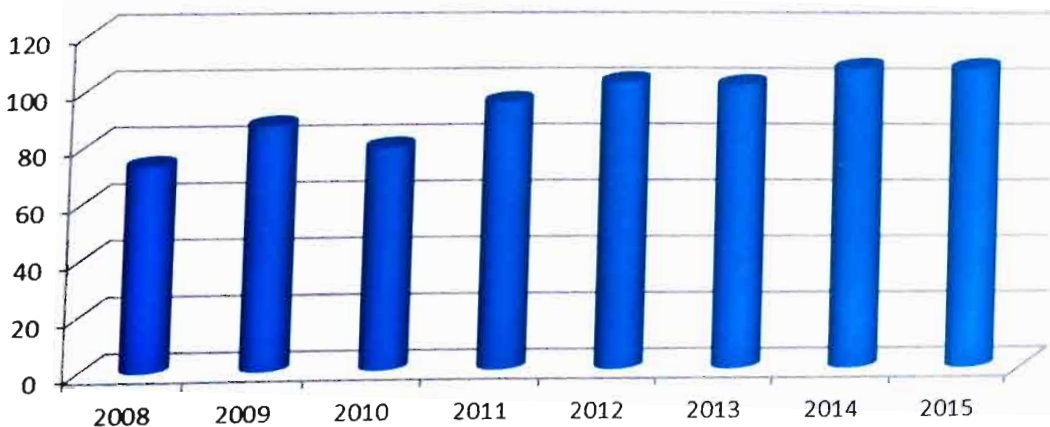
- (i) **Chairman:**- The company commandant appointed as chairman. He monitored the policy, plans and makes final decision for the execution of those plans. Presently Lt. Dr. Trijit Nanda chaired the committee.
- (ii) **Chief Advisor:** - An ex-senior most and well experienced cadet appointed as chief advisor, the cadet should be well disciplined and good record during his teneour as SUO or JUO. This appointment is nominated and selected by Company Commandant and Commanding Officer of our unit.
- (iii) **Two Sr. Advisor:** - Two senior cadets from the second year and third year are appointed as Senior Advisor. They are the rank of JUO and SUO from the both wings-Girls and Boys.
- (iv) **Two Jr. Advisor:** - Two cadets recommended and nominated by SUO, JUO, CHM and others rank. After the recommendation Company Commandant finally select two cadets for this appointment.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: - This committee is perform the regular training activities, and other respective activities of NCC and all the ranks to perform their allotted duty in their respective department like, administration, accounts, training, and quarter. They are responsible to execute the plan designed by the advisory committee. The committee also chaired by the company commandant and the duties maintained by SUO and JUO and other ranks.

THE CADET ENROLLMENT PROCESS IN OUR COLLEGE

The NCC needs the individual who can be trained by the tuff and best training process so we need that people who is intelligent and can be motivated there is no place for high ego contained person who cannot adjust or fit with the team. So we conduct an entrance examination and interview and prepare the merit list on the basis of their performance. We have the vacancies of 107 cadets including 30% of girl cadets. So we have to make the vacancies useful for the training and as well as we are focusing on the quality of the team. Because the glory and pride of our institution, Gp HQ and Directorate will be depending upon their performance. So we never compromise with the qualities of cadet even if we don't get the enough cadets to fulfill our vacancies. The entrance test organized in every academic year after the college classes started.

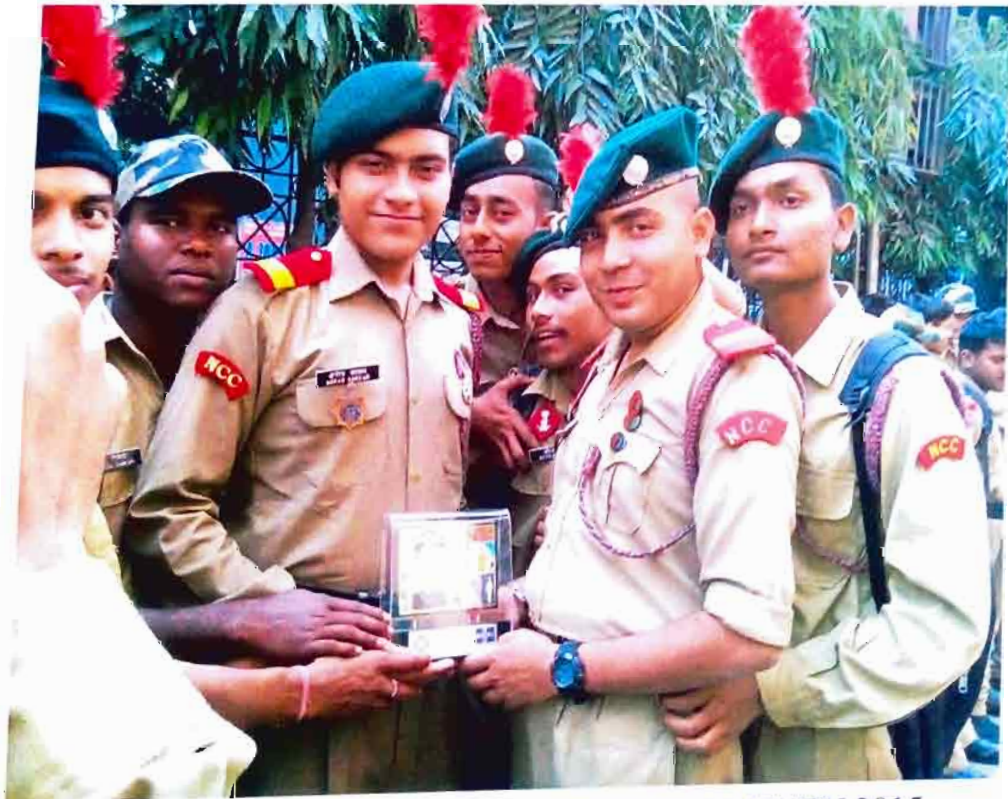
